SOLID WASTE COLLECTION

Ever wonder why we separate solid waste? Various types of solid waste are disposed of differently and have different costs for disposal. Below is an outline of how items should be separated and how they are disposed of, so you can assist in proper disposal of household waste.



HOUSEHOLD WASTE or general household waste including used paper towels, paper plates, tissues and food scraps, is picked up on your normal collection days and taken to the Tomoka Landfill for disposal in a Class I landfill.

CONTAINED YARD WASTE is picked up every Wednesday (except holiday weeks) and taken to the Tomoka Landfill where it is placed in a Class III area. The Class III tonnage cost is less than the Class I rate, thus the reason for picking up separately.

LOOSE YARD WASTE is collected on a continuous route that can take a few days to a few weeks, depending on the amount of debris placed curbside. This waste is taken to a green waste disposal facility for recycling and processing. The City receives a much better price for disposal at this facility, as it is located in Edgewater and transportation costs are minimal.

RECYCLING

Southard's Recycling collects recyclable material for Edgewater and takes it to their recycling facility for further processing. Recyclable items listed below should be placed in a recycle bin for collection. To obtain a bin, contact Environmental Services at (386) 424-2400 ext. 4007.

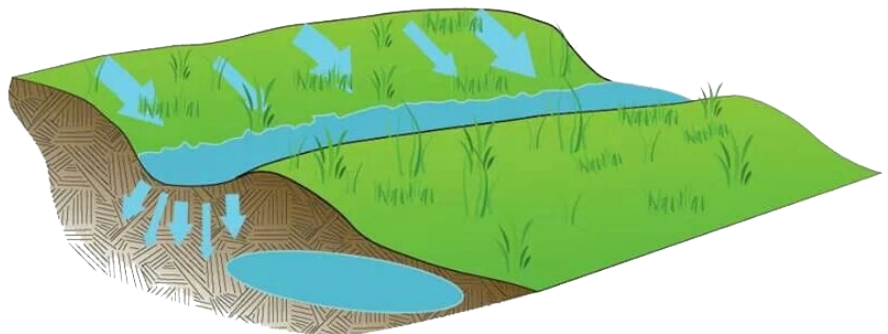

FUNCTION OF FLORIDA SHORES SWALES & CANALS

Florida Shores was developed before stormwater treatment rules were enforced in the State. Open water canals throughout Florida Shores were originally constructed as mosquito control ditches, and then houses were built around the canals, all connected by a grid of dirt roads.

In the 1990's, two big things happened: strict stormwater rules went into place statewide and all of the north-south roads in Florida Shores were paved. In order to comply with the new stormwater rules, an extensive network of dry-bottom retention ponds and swales were constructed. These dry ponds were placed into most of the east-west roads in Florida Shores with the roadside swales connecting the houses to the ponds. The system was engineered to hold a portion of rainfall within the swales and ponds and to discharge anything over that amount into the canals and out to the Indian River.

The "first flush" of rainfall contains most of the pollution that gathers on the ground, such as gas and oil, pet waste and other contaminants that have accumulated on roadways, driveways and other impervious surfaces. By holding runoff in swales and ponds and allowing the natural action of percolation to draw that water down into the soil, the majority of contaminants are treated within the soil and not discharged into the Indian River.

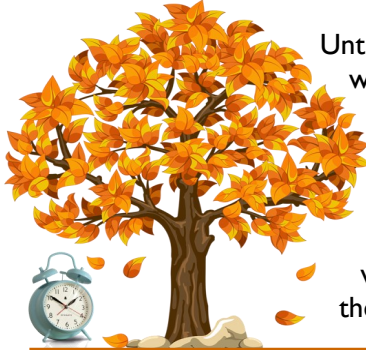


The action of percolation can take up to three (3) days to complete. When we receive rainfall day after day, it may appear as though water is standing in the swales and not draining. Meanwhile percolation is actually happening at the bottom of the swale/pond system. Remember, roadside swales are an extension of the end-of-block retention ponds and a critical part of the percolation area. In general, swales are there to hold the first portion of rainfall and to move the rest.

If there are 3 or 4 inches of water in swales and it rained within the last day or two, the swales are doing their job. If water is standing in the swales after a week or more with no rainfall or if you see an obvious blockage, please contact the City of Edgewater's Environmental Services Department to address any potential problems.

WATERING RESTRICTIONS

FALL BACK! Daylight Saving Time ENDS Sunday, November 3rd. It's time to replace smoke detector batteries, reset your irrigation system timer and make note of the changing seasonal watering restrictions.



Until March 8, 2020, ODD numbered houses water on Saturday, EVEN numbered houses water on Sunday and Non-residential properties water Tuesday each week.

Edgewater has lifted all water restrictions on Reclaimed Water, but asks residents to voluntarily refrain from watering between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

EDGEWATER UTILITY RATES

City of Edgewater utility bills are based on a BASE RATE for services at the location PLUS monthly WATER USAGE.



Below is a breakdown of charges for a regular (3/4") Residential Meter with examples of 1,000, 3,000 and 6,000 gallons of use.

Water / Wastewater Usage Rates Examples

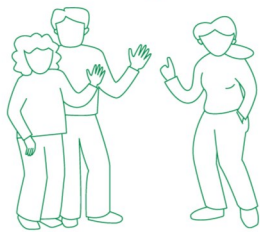

Sewer Use	\$7.29	\$21.87	\$43.74
Utility Tax (10% of water use)	\$.22	\$1.14	\$3.47
Totals for Use	\$9.66	\$34.45	\$81.87

Base Rate + Usage = Monthly Bill

1,000 gallons	\$74.78 + \$9.66 = \$84.44
3,000 gallons	\$74.78 + \$34.45 = \$109.23
6,000 gallons	\$74.78 + \$81.87 = \$156.65

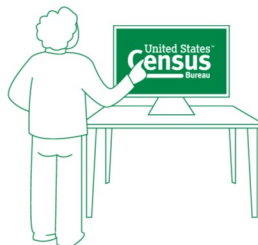
