FLOOD FACTS

No home is completely safe from flooding. Just one inch of water in a home can cost more than \$25,000 in damage. Flooding can be a devastating event.

CONSIDER THESE FLOOD FACTS:

- In the past 5 years, all 50 states have experienced floods or flash floods.
- Everyone lives in a flood zone. It is just a question of whether you live in a low, moderate or high risk area.
- Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.
- A car can easily be carried away by just two feet of floodwater.
- Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover flood damage.
- ◆ You are eligible to purchase flood insurance if you are a renter, homeowner, or business owner and your property is located in a community that participates in the National Flood Insurance Program. Edgewater participates.
- It may take 30-60 days after purchase for a policy to take effect, so it is important to buy insurance before a storm approaches.
- Even though flood insurance is not federally required, anyone can be financially vulnerable to floods. People outside of mapped high-risk flood areas file nearly 25% of all National Flood Insurance Program insurance claims and receive one-third of Federal Disaster Assistance for flooding.
- Edgewater participates in the Community Rating System (CRS) and residents can qualify for an insurance premium discount.

LOCAL SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Edgewater's Local School Scholarship Program, creates educational

CONTAINED YARD WASTE COLLECTED WEEKLY



Edgewater's Refuse Department works hard to keep up with items and yard waste placed by the road. We encourage residents to bag or contain yard waste as much as possible.

Picking up individual piles of sticks and other small vegetative items is time consuming and slows down the operation. However, if you can put those items in a container that can be picked up and emptied into garbage trucks, it greatly improves our ability to provide timely service.

We commit to picking up all bagged and contained yard waste every Wednesday (excluding holiday weeks). Uncontainable piles of vegetative debris are picked up on a continual route. Remember, if you contain it, we remove it every week.

When should garbage & recycling containers be placed out for pick-up?

Garbage and recycling containers may be placed to the street/curb the evening before collection day.

Have containers out by 7:00 a.m. for pick up and remove them no later than 11:00 p.m. on your collection day.

WHEN IT RAINS, IT DRAINS



Stormwater is the water from rain and irrigation which flows over ground or pavement without soaking into the ground.

The stormwater drainage system includes roadside swales, ditches, retention ponds, gutters, inlets, catch basins and underground pipes that collect stormwater and carry it away from streets, parking lots and yards.

Stormwater can flow into lakes, ponds and the Indian River Lagoon making our waterways part of the stormwater drainage system too.

Did you know that anything that is washed into the stormwater drainage system ends up in our waterways? Unlike wastewater from kitchens and bathrooms, stormwater is not treated before it enters these precious waters. So, remember, when it rains, it drains!

ALARM REGISTRATION

If you are considering installing an alarm in your home or business please check with the Building Department to determine if an installation permit is required. Once the alarm is installed and activated, the property owner/alarm user is required to register it with the City. You have thirty days from the date of installation or activation to register the alarm or there will be a \$50.00 charge. If you already have an existing alarm, you will be charged \$50.00 to register it unless the alarm was previously registered with us.

If you have purchased or rented a home or business with an alarm, please update the property owner/alarm user information with the City Clerk's Office.

To register your alarm please complete the alarm registration form (available on the City website or from the City Clerk's Office) and return it along with an installation certificate indicating the date the alarm was installed or activated or \$50 to the City Clerk's office by mail to: P.O. Box 100, Edgewater, FL 32132, in person at 104 N. Riverside Drive, Edgewater FL 32132 or by e-mailing cityclerk@cityofedgewater.org.

Homes with an EVEN Numbered address water on Thursday & Sunday.

NON-RESIDENTIAL properties water on Tuesday & Friday.

RECLAIMED WATER

Reclaimed watering restrictions have been lifted until further notice. Reclaimed Water may be used at any time, on any day, but please voluntarily refrain from watering between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

PROTECT OUR WATERWAYS FROM "POO"LLUTION

It is hard to believe, but approximately 60% of water pollution comes from things like runoff from washing cars, fertilizer from farms, gardens and lawns and PET WASTE.

Small sources add up to a big problem and we can do small things to help clean up our waterways. It starts by realizing that our sewers and storm water systems are separate. What goes into storm drains flows directly into the Indian River Lagoon.

When it rains, pet waste left on the ground gets washed into storm drains and stormwater drainage ditches which flow straight into the Indian River Lagoon...without being treated!

Decaying waste carries diseases, uses up oxygen and sometimes releases ammonia. It also contains nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth, making water unsafe for swimming or drinking.

Since bacteria, parasites, and viruses found in pet waste can be harmful to water quality and human health, picking up after your pet is the responsible, healthy and neighborly thing to do.



The preferred disposal method for pet waste is to scoop it, bag it and put it in the garbage. Landfills are designed to safely handle substances such as pet waste.

If you have City water, you may also choose to flush pet waste (waste only - no bags) down the toilet. It is not recommended to flush pet waste if you have a septic system and remember, never flush cat litter down the toilet.

GENERAL ELECTIONS

General Elections in the City of Edgewater are held in even-numbered years on the date established by the Florida Election Code for the primary election. The date of the next General Election will be **November 8**, **2022**. In 2022, the Mayor and Districts I and 3 will be up for election. A Primary Election is held only in the event that two or more candidates qualify for a District/Mayor. If no candidate received the majority of the votes during the Primary Election the two candidates with the largest number of votes will be placed on the General Election

Municipal elections are non-partisan. The terms of office for all seats are four (4) years, with

Ballot. The date of the next Primary Election, if required, will be August 23, 2022.

RUNNING FOR CITY COUNCIL

ARE YOU

In order to qualify to run for City Council candidates must be a qualified elector of the City of Edgewater and must have or will have resided within the district they will qualify for at least one (1) year immediately preceding the date of the election.

If you are interested in running for City Council, it is important that you contact the City Clerk's office to obtain information about the specific requirements for filing.

The City Clerk shall have qualifying forms available for completion by any candidate who wishes to run for the City Council. All qualifying forms and the qualifying fee shall be filed by a candidate at the time and on the dates established by the Florida Election Code of each even-numbered year, unless otherwise set by adoption of a resolution by the City Commission. Qualifying dates for the 2022 Election will be from 12:00 p.m., June 13, 2022 through 12:00 p.m., June 17, 2022.
