WHEN IT RAINS, IT DRAINS

Stormwater is the water from rain and irrigation which flows over ground or pavement without soaking into the ground.

The stormwater drainage system includes roadside swales, ditches, retention ponds, gutters, inlets, catch basins and underground pipes that collect stormwater and carry it away from streets, parking lots and yards.

Did you know that anything that is washed into the stormwater drainage system ends up in our waterways? Unlike wastewater from kitchens and bathrooms, stormwater is not treated before it enters these precious waters. Since stormwater flows into lakes, ponds and the Indian River Lagoon, our waterways are part of the stormwater drainage system too.

Just remember, when it rains, it drains!





HELP STOP POO-LUTION

Cleaning up pet waste is part of being a responsible pet owner and is also required by City Code. When it rains, pet waste left on the ground gets washed into stormwater drains and drainage ditches which flow to our local waterways, without being treated!

Bacteria, parasites and viruses found in pet waste can be harmful to water quality and human health. So, picking up after your pet is the responsible, neighborly and healthy thing to do for yourself and the environment! Remember to clean up pet waste in your own yard as well.

Get rid of pet waste by scooping it into a bag and then disposing of it in the garbage or placing it into your toilet un-bagged. Help keep our waterways clean, be part of the solution and help Stop "poo"llution!

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FLOOD FACTS

No home is completely safe from flooding. Just one inch of water in a home can cost more than \$25,000 in damage and flooding can be a devastating event.



CONSIDER THESE FLOOD FACTS:

- In the past 5 years, all 50 states have experienced floods or flash floods.
- Everyone lives in a flood zone. It is just a question of whether you live in a low, moderate or high risk area.
- Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage.
- A car can easily be carried away by just two feet of floodwater.
- Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover flood damage.
- You are eligible to purchase flood insurance if you are a renter, homeowner, or business owner and your property is located in a community that participates in the National Flood Insurance Program. Edgewater participates.
- It may take 30-60 days after purchase for a policy to take effect, so it is important to buy insurance before a storm approaches.
- Even though flood insurance is not federally required, anyone can be financially vulnerable to floods. People outside of mapped high-risk flood areas file nearly 25% of all National Flood Insurance Program insurance claims and receive one-third of Federal Disaster Assistance for flooding.
- Edgewater participates in the Community Rating System (CRS) and residents can qualify for an insurance premium discount.

NON-RESIDENTIAL properties water on Tuesday & Friday.

Reclaimed watering restrictions have been lifted until further notice. Reclaimed Water may be used at any time, on any day, but please voluntarily refrain from watering between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

SHARE THE ROAD - BIKE SAFETY AWARENESS

By law, bicycles on the road are vehicles with the same right to use the roadway as motor vehicles. Of course, this also means that cyclists must obey the same traffic rules and regulations too. These laws include stopping for stop signs and red lights, riding with the flow of traffic, using lights at night, and yielding the right-of-way when entering any road. It is the responsibility of both riders and drivers to safely share the road and treat each other with care and respect while sharing it.



Here are a few ways drivers can share the road with those using pedal power.

<u>Be Patient</u>. If the lane is too narrow, if there is oncoming traffic or if you do not have enough visibility to pass...don't.

<u>Reduce Your Speed.</u> When approaching a bicycle, slow down. Even if there is a bike lane, unexpected obstacles such as an opening car door, may cause the rider to swerve into traffic.


<u>Don't Honk.</u> You could startle the rider. Make eye contact and, if you make a mistake, everyone loves a courtesy wave.

<u>Be Extra Cautious of Children</u>. They can be unpredictable and much less aware of dangers around them.

Even though bicycles are allowed to ride on the road, some cyclists prefer to use sidewalks. Generally, it is legal to ride a bike on a sidewalk in Florida. Cyclists biking on a sidewalk have the same responsibilities as pedestrians and must always yield to pedestrians, plus provide an audible signal before passing them. Where sidewalks are available, they may provide greater safety or accessibility.

Get Outside! The weather is warming up and Edgewater is home to fantastic trails to walk and bicycle. Start at Rotary Park, on Park Avenue, or at Cow Creek Road, just South of SR 442 to enjoy beautiful paved trails that are part of the St. John's River to Sea Loop and the East Coast Regional Rail Trail system.
